### REPORT FROM THE CHAPTER CHAIR

First and foremost, I would like to say thank you to everyone who supported AMC this past year. In these tumultuous times our conservation first message needs to be heard and by being active in AMC your voices will be heard.

2018 was another exciting year for the NY – No.J Chapter. The annual picnic saw record attendance! We had 199 people, 200 if you count the bear. We are set to have another blow-out in 2019 so stay tuned for the details to come. Our leadership training program continues to produce excellent new leaders who are adding some new innovations to trips. We will have another training weekend this year in May.

I cannot say enough about the wonderful work our Wilderness First Aid Team has accomplished. Their classes continue to sell out. An ER nurse who took the class this year remarked that it was a great refresher and reminded her to think about different ways to approach an incident. There will be a big change in 2019 for the program. Johnathan Silver who started the program will be stepping down as chair after over 20 years in filling the position. Johnathan's classes have educated many of our leaders and that training has been used creating a safer environment for our trip's participants. Richard Dabal the incoming chair has been working closely with Johnathan and I'm certain will continue providing affordable first aid education to our leaders.

We had another stellar year at the Fire Island Cabin and another long-time committee chair and member is retiring. Anita Barberis who has stewarded the cabin to its beloved place among our members will be retiring at the end of 2018. She has chaired and served on the committee for over 25 years. Diane Serlin has taken over for her and is continuing Anita's work in expanding the offering of the cabin and working with the club to broaden the cabin's constituency.

It has taken a scant three years for the Harriman Program Committee to become a cornerstone of the Chapters offerings. With almost 600 participants this year we have just about reached our threshold! Our 2019 schedule is already in place and we will begin taking reservations soon. A special

thanks goes out to former chapter chair and current Harriman Program Committee Chair Eileen Yin for her remarkable work.

The Chapter has continued its work with other organizations to reach into new demographics to spread our conservation message. Our goal is to work with other groups to expose them to nature and get them involved in protecting the environment in their home communities. The Chapter is looking to become more involved in conservation efforts within our local communities. If you know of any local projects or outdoor groups that you think might work well with us, please let me or our conservation chair know.

Diversity, Equity and Inclusion (DEI) training is now part of our leadership training model and we will be offering a training class to everyone in the coming months. The past several years has seen a dramatic shift within the chapter's demographics. The wonderful expansion of our Young Members Committee has been instrumental to the success of this initiative. As the chapter continues to grow and expand into new areas understanding how our actions affect those around us is important in maintaining a welcoming environment. 



### ACTIVITY COMMITTEE REPORTS

### BACKPACKING David Mong, Chair

The Ny-NoJ Backpacking Committee scheduled 62 overnight trips varying in length from 2 to 4 days. In total 45 of those trips ran. Our scheduled trips marked an improvement over last year by 32% though our weather related cancellations were much higher. We still ended up with 3 more trips that ran as compared to last year. Our total number of participants served was comparable to last year. Our focus has been on having a lot of trips geared for novice and beginner backpackers so they can learn the skills to safely enjoy the wilderness on their own.

As a committee we are committed to building up a group of leaders that can continue to serve the needs of the region with high quality backpacking programs. As part of that effort we increased the number of co-leaders on trips from 13 last year to 25 this year. We have a great group of leader trainees in the midst of their process of becoming leaders.

#### Donations to The Ragged Mountain Foundation, Connecticut Forest and Park Association.

Therefore in 2018 we continued support of Connecticut nonprofit organizations dedicated to conservation, preservation and maintenance of public access and trails in Connecticut Forests. We normally make a donation to the Gunks Rescue squad for their great effort in responding to climbers, hikers and bikers who enjoy the Shawangunks. Unfortunately, this year we could not afford to do so this year due to the unexpected costs with the summer picnic venue. Previously we were able to access the Pavilion at the Mohonk Preserve for free but this year they requested a \$500 fee

#### Spring Training Class 2018 and WTTG

Over the course of two weekends in April, the Committee initiated 16 new members. With skillful guidance of 17 Climbing Committee volunteers, the new AMC climbers learned skills needed to climb with the club. The Training Class culminated with Welcome to the Gunks (WTTG) event. The recent graduates are introduced to one of the best outdoor rock climbing areas in North East, The Shawagunks. Here is the class of 2018 !!



You can see that the climbing committee strives for diversity and inclusion. We had more men then women apply for the training program this year but we targeted 50/50 split female to male.

We also had a few highly skilled lead-rock-climbers join our committee during the year. All these individuals were reviewed by senior members of our committee and were deemed skill enough to be accepted into the committee. Not all candidates were accepted, adhering to our long standing tradition of safe climbing.

#### The Golden Cam Award

The 2018 Golden Cam recipient is Daryl Cheang who embodies the spirit of giving back to our AMC climbing community though his service and commitment. Since joining the Committee, Daryl has provided his artistic skills to design our training tee-shirt along with all our event posters and flyers. Daryl has mentored aspiring climbers and helps with the annual training program. Daryl is passionate about the outdoors and helps support gaining access to public spaces. Thank you to our Crasin (aka Crazy Asian)!

Single Pitch Instructor training with Alpine Endeavors.

Although all of us enjoy and participate in top-rope climbing and multi-pitch climbing, advancing to be a confident lead climber (aka "being on the sharp end of the rope") takes significant commitment and time. In order to assist a few club members in making this commitment, the club helped offset some of the costs. We continue growing our leaders by supporting their interests in obtaining their Single Pitch Instructor certification by sponsoring 2 members and would like to expand it going forward.

### **Top Rope Socials**

Every month, we conduct top rope socials which allow a more social climbing environment. These events are a great way to try more challenging terrain than you might lead or even second. We take the opportunity to reinforce new techniques that require more focused time to learn. These events usually include sharing of food to further enhance the social aspect.

### Summer Workshops

Every summer the Committee organizes climbing workshops. In 2018 thanks to our experienced veteran members, the following climbing workshops took place:

- "Getting Back to the Ground" Workshop The self-rescue workshop featured various rappelling techniques and belay escapes, all of which are invaluable when faced with climbing mishaps.
- Leading Workshops In this one-on-one workshop, a new lead climber climbs with experience lead climber. During their session, depending on experience of the new lead climber, either on mock-leads or actual lead, the climber receives suggestions on critical gear placement, anchor set-up, and gear retrieval.
- Anchor Placement Workshop This workshop was offered for both leaders as well as seconds. Reliable gear placements and solid anchor building are key skills that make a climber safe.
- Rappelling with an injured climber a very challenging endeavor when dealing with full body weight of someone hanging from single rope.

### Wilderness First Aid

It is important to our Committee that all our members are proficient in first response/first aid scenario in the outdoors. Due to popular demand, this year, the Climbing Committee organized and subsidized AMC Wilderness First Aid Course exclusively for our members. The class was offered and lead by our own Certified Climbing Committee member, Christiane Siebert.



### Annual Picnic at the Singerland Pavilion in Mohonk Preserve.

Keeping with our annual tradition, in September, our best event yet, the Annual Picnic, took place. Cybill took over the organization of this event. Cybill and the other volunteers did a superb job organizing it. Climbing and travel stories were told and the exchange of experience was priceless. A fun raffle brought this evening to an end. We honored the many attendees who have been committee members for decades.

### Helping develop or expand climbing crags.

Over the past few years our members have assisted in the accessibility of several climbing crags in the greater NYC area. This includes helping develop and maintain trails through the greater Mohonk preserve area including Dickie Barre. The goal is to keep the setting as natural as possible and reduce the number of unnecessary trails, this is especially difficult given the number of climbers and high concentration along the carriage road. We have helped create, develop and maintain the Powerlinz climbing area that is part of Harriman state park, this expansion is helping reduce the volume at the Gunks.

### HIKING

Hiking had another great year. We expanded our trip offerings in New Jersey with the addition of several new leaders from the Garden State. Mirmar and AMC partnered to offer a multiday hiking trip to Stowe, VT and a great time was had by all. There were several medical incidents over the past year and all were handled wonderfully by our trip leaders, a special thank you to the wilderness first aid committee for preparing our leaders to handle emergencies. The Harriman Program Committee offered a Wilderness Skills Weekend that was attended by leaders to improve our level of preparedness in the field. Everyone learned some new skills and refreshed some old ones. We never knew fire building could be so much fun.

### SAILING

### SOFTBALL

The softball committee consists of ten members who organize the AMC softball activities. We meet annually in the winter and as needed during the softball season, April through late fall, weather permitting. During the season, and throughout the year, committee members contact each other via email, in addition to our informal, frequent meetings on the field.

We meet Sunday mornings at 11:00 am and play until 3 pm. Approximately thirty plus to fifty plus players show up each week. We have 2 fields and play 2 games on each. We go over the rules/make

announcements each week before the start of play. Sides/teams are randomly chosen for each game allowing everyone to mix, mingle and team up with a variety of teammates.

AMC softball games include a diverse group of members that age from their twenties into their seventies. Players of all skill levels are welcome and we try to foster supportive, harmonious, injury-preventing atmosphere. This is also reflected in our rules of the games. We also try to accommodate a player's wishes, for example, as to a particular position he/she might want to play. The games are posted on the AMC site and on Meetup (450+ members). A camaraderie has developed amongst the participants. As an example, players use the Meetup site to encourage a sick player to recover quickly, to comment about the games, to enjoy reading one of our committee member's weekly diary. Everyone looks forward to our annual pizza party.

We collect \$5 from each player each week to cover expenses which include buying and transporting equipment; fees for field permits and Meetup.

### YOUNG MEMBERS

### **Co-Chairs Thomas Meehan and Rafal Rogoza**

Our committee continues to grow and had become more active in providing volunteers for chapter wide activities. The monthly Thirsty Third Thursdays are a huge success and our turnouts continue to grow. The NY-No.J Chapter had been active in club wide YM events such as the YM takeover at Harriman. In 2018 all of the clubs YM committee pitched in and rented the entire camp for a fun filled weekend. Our annual MLK ski trip sold out in 2018 and is sold out for 2019 as well. The inter-chapter YM leadership training weekends have been instrumental in providing the necessary interaction between chapters that are leading the way to bigger events for all the clubs YM committees. We have an active calendar planned for 2019 as well and everyone is welcome to attend our planning meetings which occur on the first Wednesday of the month. Looking forward to seeing you there.

### LEADERSHIP

### Ed Sobin, Chair

In this third year of the Leadership Committee we're continuing to look for new ways to train more leaders. The Leadership Training weekend is now geared only to train new leaders and is reliably run each spring. The prior years had it in the fall once and also tried to have a track for experienced leaders as well as for new leaders.

Our goals are basically unchanged -

1) Make it easier to get new leaders trained and leading activities

2) Make sure potential leaders learn the basic AMC leadership skills that aren't activity specific (i.e. trip planning, incident reporting, trip talk at the start, using the ActDB and social media, liability issues, etc.) so that the activity committees can concentrate on the skills needed for the activity

3) Make it easier for AMC leaders to lead for different chapters if they move out of (or into) the NY/NJ area.

Activity highlights -

1) While not run by this committee there were a few leadership initiatives worth mentioning. At the club level there were some Young Member oriented (but not limited to YM of course) leadership weekends and also work done to partner with a local college to train their students. Those trained are handled as if they attended the chapter training. They still have to fulfill the requirements of the activity they want to lead for (e.g. lead 2 hikes with a mentor, etc.).

2) The Leadership Workshop Weekend at Harriman Outdoor Center had 31 (up from 17 the prior year) potential new leaders attending.

3) We are continuing to sharing new leader info between the nearby Delaware Valley and Connecticut chapters. This has been helpful to a few that live in between the 2 chapters. For instance we trained a leader here and they did their mentored activities at DV and can now lead for both chapters.

4) While we plan to continue offering half day intro leadership classes at the club office next year, this past year there were none.

Plans for next year -

1) Improve tracking the Leaders in Training as they progress towards becoming leaders

2) Improve communication and assistance to help the Leaders in Training become leaders

3) Run another Leadership Workshop (already scheduled for May 17-19 in Harriman)

4) Continue with the half day intro classes

### ADVISORY

### Eileen Yin, Chair

The Advisory Committee provides two services to the Executive Committee: a) ad hoc advice and guidance upon request and b) management of the Chapter's Volunteer Recognition Awards.

This is the second year the Advisory Committee oversaw the selection process for the Chapter's four Volunteer Recognition Awards. The Selection Panel for Appie of the Year was comprised of 10 former Chapter Chairs. The Selection Panel for all other Volunteer Recognition Awards was the Executive Committee. There were 39 candidates for Awards this year.

The Chapter's Volunteer Recognition Awards are:

- <u>Appie of the Year Award</u>: For an individual who gives selflessly of him/herself for the good of the club; one who works tirelessly, often behind the scenes, organizing, leading in fact and by example; someone who has served in this manner for several years, thus over time continuing this commitment; an active volunteer, rather than someone who served well in the past, or for a limited time. The Appie exemplifies what is best about the volunteer ethic that makes our Club, and most particularly our Chapter, so special.

- **Inspiration Award**: For a member who embodies the spirit of our chapter and inspires others by leading, mentoring, or encouraging leadership or activity for AMC this year.

- <u>Ambassador Award</u> : For a member who encourages others to participate with AMC or promotes AMC and our Chapter by recruiting, speaking for or representing AMC at events (including in office, outside venue or related to an activity), etc this year.

- <u>Unsung Hero Award</u>: For a member who supports the chapter in less visible or celebrated ways behind the scenes , such as public service (conservation, trails), communications, editing, committee service, record keeping, etc this year.

### CONSERVATION

The conservation committee was active this year in promoting the save the Land Water Conservation Fund. We also ran seminars on Leave No Trace and the chapters initiative of Erase the Trace. Our incoming chair Danni has some family-oriented presentation on how to have fun and save money with recycling and repurposing everyday projects. ### FIRE ISLAND Diane Serlin, Chair

No other AMC Facility had as dramatic a season as the Fire Island Cabin had this year!

In early March, John Judge advised the new Chair that the Fire Island Cabin was going to be put up for sale, and our 2018 season was cancelled effective immediately. Out of that devastating news, the most amazing chain of events began, resulting in a new, stronger relationship between the Cabin and management in Boston, and, with the Chapter.

Members in the Chapter were up in arms over the proposed sale-- Nathan put the FI Cabin on the agenda for the Chapter's March meeting. Over 80 people showed up, and all of us present were treated to story after story of what Fire Island meant to each person who spoke: long time members, children, volunteers, guests. John and Rol (the Chair of the Board of Directors) viewed the meeting via the Facebook live broadcast and decided a few days later to cancel the vote on the sale of the Cabin. John and Rol and other Board of Directors came out to the Cabin in August for a meeting. We agreed to listen and learn from each other, to ensure that going forward the Cabin would be the best possible representative of the AMC mission and goals for the future.

We scrambled to get the Summer schedule back on track, and we wound up with our best season in several years. Here is what we looked like:

We opened Memorial Day weekend with sloop rides on the Great South Bay, and ended the last weekend in September with Irish Dancing. In between, we ran our usual water based events: Two Learn to Sail weekends, an Adventure Sail for experienced sailors, and two midweek sail schools. For kayakers we had two learn to paddle weekends, one devoted to intermediate kayakers and a 3 day midweek kayak workshop.

Other activities included yoga, painting, chess and music. We ran two Young Member's weekend and will do so again in 2019. We had three Family midweeks AND were totally excited to connect with a nonprofit organization called Kids Passport to Adventure—a group that promotes learning experiences in nature for children. Twenty eight children spent a day at the Cabin. We partnered with FINS for a trek the rangers run from the east part of Fire Island, to the Cabin, where they spend the night.

In addition to the usual repairs to the structures on the property, due to its position on a barrier island buffeted by salty winds and waters, we had one structural change to the Cabin. A bunk bed was removed from each of our two dorms, to accommodate the installation of a wall of windows. They look nice, and greatly improve air flow. But, we now sleep 22 people instead of 24. We are looking at ways to increase our capacity. Tent platforms on the property are not out of the question!

In an effort to improve our reservation process, we used the Call Center for weekend reservations in 2018, and are in conversation to have the Call Center handle the midweeks as well, for next season.







### TRAILS COMMITTEE

Many hard-working AMC maintainers took care of 9 miles of trails east of the Hudson, 17 miles in New Jersey, and 41 miles west of the Hudson, primarily in Harriman/Bear Mt. State Parks, as well as the Siwanoy Trail in the Bronx. A hot and rainy summer gave us plenty of growth to deal with but also caused several maintenance outings to be cancelled due to bad weather.

Joe Rodriguez supervised efforts east of the Hudson. Steve Weissman, who also directs maintenance for the AT in New Jersey, continued to direct a highly organized group of maintainers in New Jersey. In Harriman/Bear Mt. State Park, Bill Hladky, always raring to go, supported, assisted and recruited a large troupe of maintainers. And in the Bronx, Ken West supervised urban trails.



A chapter picnic on a very hot June 30 drew a hardy core of heat-resistant maintainers. It was a chance for maintainers, who often work alone, to meet each other.

The chapter keeps a stash of trail maintenance tools at the Corman Harriman Outdoor Center. These tools can be used for group trail maintenance outings, or for individual maintainers who don't have tools of their own. So we hope it's now easy for

more people, including those using public transportation, to join in maintaining our many beautiful trails. We're always in the market for more maintainers!



### WILDERNESS FIRST AID Jonathan Silver, Chair

The mission of the Wilderness First Aid committee is to provide professional quality wilderness first aid training to chapter members and to encourage members to get this kind of training. We stand ready to provide support to any unit of the club who wishes to learn more about wilderness emergency care.

During 2018, our twenty-first year, we conducted 5 WFA courses. We trained over 70 chapter members and others in the basics of wilderness emergency care.

The committee rolled out a new version of the WFA course this year, bringing it up to date and making it compliant with the *Guidelines and Scope of Practice for Wilderness First Aid*, a new industry standard. Additionally, the entire slide-set for the course as provided by ECSI was modified for our 16-hour course to make it better conform with our text book *Wilderness First Aid* – *Emergency Care in Remote Locations*  $5^{th}$  edition.

We would like to introduce a new instructor candidate, Graham Donohue. Graham comes to us with a wealth of experience in both civilian and military emergency medicine. We look forward to working with Graham during the coming year.

We will continue to run our voucher program in 2019. The WFA committee makes available two vouchers to each activity committee chair for distribution to people active in their committee. Each voucher is worth \$40.00 off the cost of a WFA committee sponsored wilderness first aid course.

The WFA committee is constantly on the lookout for new, qualified instructors. If you or anyone you know has significant pre-hospital emergency care (EMT, Ski Patrol, etc.) and outdoor experience, we encourage you to have them contact Richard Dabal at <u>WildernessFirstAid@amc-ny.org</u>.

Finally, I will be stepping down as committee chair effective the end of 2018. Richard Dabal will be taking up the duties as the new committee chair. We wish Richard the very best in moving the committee forward into the future.

### Harriman Program Committee

### Eileen Yin, Chair

The Chapter celebrated a successful third season at the Corman AMC Harriman Outdoor Center! We never let the poor weather get us down.

The Harriman Program Committee (HPC) is dedicated to getting as many people as possible to enjoy the outdoors by utilizing The Stephen & Betsy Corman AMC Harriman Outdoor Center (CHOC). Each year, HPC develops a schedule of chapter-sponsored, volunteer-led programs that promote the AMC's and New York-North Jersey Chapter's Mission, Vision, Goals and Objectives. HPC Programs offer fun outdoor activities, skills instruction, leader training, new member events, family programs, and social events.

### Programs

Chapter programs ran from May 18 through September 30, 2018. The biggest challenge was atrocious weather. We either suffered terrible rainy forecasts or horrendous heat and humidity every single weekend throughout the season. Understandably, there were fewer registrations than anticipated.

Nevertheless, all programs continued as planned and everyone who participated had a great time. Only Novice Backpacking was rescheduled due to thunderstorms.

In 2018, New York-North Jersey Chapter offered 32 Programs at CHOC, including the iconic Chapter Picnic and Leadership Training Workshop sponsored by the Executive Committee, and 30 Events organized by HPC. Six events were sold out or oversubscribed, including the ever popular Picnic, Yoga, Ladies Canoe & Kayak, and Fall Hiking & Fine Dining Weekends.

New this year were programs targeted to engage more diverse audiences, such as LGBTQ Friends & Family and Outdoor Afro Weekends, and programs that offered hard skills instruction, such as Novice Backpacking and Wilderness Skills Weekends. HPC also piloted Arts in the Outdoors, with two Photography Workshops and a Writers Woodland Retreat.

Some experimental programs ultimately attracted only small numbers. Three Bikepacking Lite cyclists rode 60 mostly trail miles from CHOC to GWB. Seven caffeine-loving Friends of Bill W participants were fewer than we hoped, but all were new to CHOC and planned to return. And while constant rain kept the Interchapter Midsummer Frolic numbers to only 28 participants, the intrepid members of the New York-North Jersey, Delaware Valley, and Mohawk Hudson chapters braved the weather and went out on multiple hikes and paddling activities, plus played games and watched movies in the evening.

One benefit of the rainy season was a bumper crop of wild fungi. Tat Yuen's wildly popular Mushroom Identification Walk around Breakneck Pond had to be capped. Lucky participants not only learned about the mushrooms around camp, but also were treated to a unique tasting experience in Stone Lodge!

Based on the tremendous turnout last year for the Young Member Camping Events and their campfire karaoke-ers, HPC tweaked the program design this year so most events offered both cabin and more economical camping options. It was such a popular option, that at the Fall Wilderness First Aid course, students eschewed cabin bunks altogether; All overnight participants chose to camp! Tenting novices and mass transit riders loved the free camping equipment provided by the camp!

### Volunteers

HPC is grateful to our 36 HPC Leaders who led wonderful programs. We also appreciate the dedicated Spring Work Day Volunteers, led by John Rowen, who prepared the camp for Opening Day. Five Volunteers joined the Committee and will take on the hard work of preparing the 2019 HPC Program Schedule. Herb Zoota accepted the HPC Vice Chair this autumn and has already been instrumental in compiling the 2019 schedule.

### Participants

NY-NoJ Chapter brought more than 640 participants through CHOC. Of these, more than 100 enjoyed themselves so much they joined more than one chapter event! It was also exciting to see that many participants went on to make their own private reservations and introduced their friends to CHOC. AMC members receive a 20% discount for all chapter events at CHOC.

The majority of event participants are current AMC members. Approximately 15% of participants are Non-members. Approximately 6.5% of participants joined AMC for the first time or renewed their membership in order to take advantage of preferred member pricing for HPC Programs. In the past 3 years, overall 1,350 participants joined Chapter events at CHOC.

### Administration

HPC continued to leverage online tools. The EventBrite Registration application provided the Chapter with financial transparency and fiscal controls. The Asana Task Management tool prompted leaders to make time-sensitive decisions and meet deadlines. Survey Monkey provided the platform to collect "Voice of the Customer" feedback from our participants that was so valuable when planning the following year's program.

### Financials

HPC priced programs to break even financially at year-end. HPC ended the season with a \$667.63 Net Loss. Although registrations were subdued by foul weather, Day Use and sold out programs tempered the effect.

NY-NoJ Chapter is one of the largest CHOC clients. This year, the chapter spent more than \$46,400 at CHOC on accommodations, meeting rooms, meals and sundries at CHOC. In the past three years, overall the chapter spent more than \$90,000 at CHOC.

### Looking forward to 2019!

The 2019 HPC Program Schedule includes 28 programs, so far. Members can look forward to expanded popular programs, including Yoga & Hiking and Yoga & Self-care Weekends. New pilot programs include fun social events, such as Dance-Hike-Sing! and Latin Dace Exercise. We're also experimenting with a Seniors Midweek and Group Trail Maintenance Events. Keep your eyes open for more information in April 2019!
