REPORT FROM THE CHAPTER CHAIR



My two years as Chapter Chair have flown by fast because of the amazing work our volunteers accomplished. My term started off with goals of promoting community, communication and leadership within the Chapter. We did all of this while supporting the opening of the Corman Harriman Outdoor Center (CHOC) and contributing to the initial ideas for using the camp.

There are many people that need to be thanked for their work contributing to the goals the Executive Committee proposed. The Young Members Committee chaired by Silja Tobin staffed our picnic committee. Melissa Marine, working with Silja, volunteered to be picnic chair and did such a great job we promoted her to Hospitality Chair. We had 175 people for the day and 120 for the night. It was so much fun that we decided to do it again in 2018.

Silja Tobin has served as the Young Members Committee Chair for the last two years. She helped develop a strong core group into a large community. Under her direction, trips to NH and the ADKS have been organized, Fire Island and CHOC weekends were extremely popular and most importantly we have a new group of leaders. We are very sorry to see her leave us, but Portland Oregon beckons. We cannot thank her enough.

The CHOC served as the center for so many Chapter Programs for the last two years. Eileen Yin, our former Chapter Chair, has worked endlessly on developing hosts and organizing programs that sell out. She spent most of last summer and this summer in camp working with volunteers to help get them

familiar with the facilities and organizing programs ranging from the very popular Yoga weekends, beginner backpacking, learn to paddle, Dark Skies, and of course hiking. Both members and nonmembers alike were introduced to the outdoors in the beautiful setting on Breakneck Pond. Next year we plan over 20 weekends, so be sure to sign up.

Our communications team headed by Lee Hoffman worked to get monthly eblasts out advertising our events. Trails and Waves has come out 3 times a year edited by Ron Gonzalez with layout design by Marty Plante. Tat Yuen never fails to respond to requests to update our website, usually within an hour! There have been monthly Open Houses to allow new and prospective members a chance to ask questions. Our Facebook likes have grown to over 3,200 "Likes". The Meetup Page reaches almost 9,000 people and helps bring in new members. In addition, we've been able to start up our Speaker Program series through the hard work of Carrie Ho. Many of these events have attracted over 75 people.

The Leadership Committee under the direction of Ed Sobin has worked endlessly developing the Chapter Path to Leadership. Henry Schreiber has devoted several Saturdays to teaching a shortened leader training class ensuring that all leaders have a minimum level of knowledge. In addition, the leadership committee held a weekend long class and trained 20 Leaders in Training. The training is already paying off with new names in the schedule.

It wasn't always easy getting all of this done, but I along with the rest of the Executive Committee and our many volunteers who went above and beyond sure had a lot of fun. Nathan, I wish you the best, you will make a great Chapter Chair and looking forward to seeing what comes next.


The year kicked off with our Annual Pool sessions, feedback was extremely positive, Master Trip Leader Vadim Stepaniuk had another great season.

Donations to The Ragged Mountain Foundation, Connecticut Forest and Park Association.



The Golden Cam Award

The 2017 Golden Cam recipient is Mike Geramita who embodies the spirit of giving back to our AMC climbing community though his service and commitment. Since joining the Committee, Mike has been an active member helping organize our winter solstice dinner, treasurer and leading a portion of the participating at Spring Training Class. Thank you Mike!

Single Pitch Instructor training with Alpine Endeavors.

Although all of us enjoy and participate in top-rope climbing and multi-pitch climbing, advancing to be a confident lead climber (aka "being on the sharp end of the rope") takes significant commitment and time. In order to assist a few club members in making this commitment, the club helped offset some of the costs. We continue growing our leaders by supporting their interests in obtaining their Single Pitch Instructor certification by sponsoring 3 members and would like to expand it going forward.

Carbs and Caffeine

One of our members suggested a Carbs and Caffeine program where the weekly registrar is provided \$20 to offset the cost for providing a morning coffee or bagel to help get things going before a day of climbing.

Top Rope Socials

Every month, we conduct top rope socials which allow a more social climbing environment. These events are a great way to try more challenging terrain than you might lead or even second. We take the opportunity to reinforce new techniques that require more focused time to learn. These events usually include sharing of food to further enhance the social aspect.

Summer Workshops

Every summer the Committee organizes climbing workshops. In 2017, thanks to our experienced veteran members, the following climbing workshops took place:

- "Getting Back to the Ground" Workshop The self-rescue workshop featured various rappelling techniques and belay escapes, all of which are invaluable when faced with climbing mishaps.
- Leading Workshops In this one-on-one workshop, a new lead climber climbs with experience lead climber. During their session, depending on experience of the new lead climber, either on

mock-leads or actual lead, the climber receives suggestions on critical gear placement, anchor set-up, and gear retrieval.

- Anchor Placement Workshop This workshop was offered for both leaders as well as seconds. Reliable gear placements and solid anchor building are key skills that make a climber safe.
- Rappelling with an injured climber a very challenging endeavor when dealing with full body weight of someone hanging from single rope.

Wilderness First Aid

It is important to our Committee that all our members are proficient in first response/first aid scenario in the outdoors. Due to popular demand, this year, the Climbing Committee organized and subsidized AMC Wilderness First Aid Course exclusively for our members. The class was offered and lead by our own Certified Climbing Committee member, Christiane Siebert.

HIKING

The NY-NoJ Chapter Hiking Committee functioned smoothly and efficiently in 2017, with maximum participation and minimum friction among the many leaders who contribute to the running of the largest committee in the NY-NoJ Chapter.



The Hiking Committee has received frequent complaints about posting on Activities database, and the time it takes for approval. To promote expediency in posting, the hiking committee implemented a new approval process to expedite hike postings. Specifically, the committee removed all "reviewers" from the approval process. In conjunction, the committee increased the number of approvers. Presently, there are 13 approvers. In this manner, unposted but submitted hikes will not linger on the website.



This year we added around 13 new leaders. We have 112 leaders and co-leaders. The CCNY group has been especially active in this, and the hike posting field and deserves special recognition. As there are still potential leaders in the pipeline, and our level of training has increased, it is expected that many new, quality hiking leaders will join the ranks this year.

SAILING John Sheets, Chair

2017 continued to be a transition and rebuilding year for the AMC Sailing Committee. As noted in previous year's report, many of the committee's sailing instructors who have been trip leaders for 20 to 30 years or more with the committee and they have either retired from their jobs, moved to other locations or are no longer leading trips, the committee is in the process of recruiting sailors to be instructors.

Since I began as the new Chair shortly before the 2015 sailing season started, we went into that season as well as the 2016 and 2017 season with



terrific trip leaders. These included Dan Parietti, a seasoned AMC Sailing Committee veteran and expert Lightning (19' sloop) racer – who recruited Richard Leonard in 2016, also an expert Lightning racer, through the Nyack Boat Club on the Hudson River. In addition, Jesse Schaffer completed his third season with us. Jesse is a former Tall Ship captain, whom I recruited in 2015, as a new trip leader, through our sailing together for many years aboard Schooner Pioneer (103' 65 ton schooner) at the South Street Seaport https://southstreetseaportmuseum.org/visit/street-of-ships/pioneer/ and aboard the Mystic Whaler (110' 100 ton schooner) https://www.mysticwhalercruises.com/ out of New London, CT.

In our 2017 season, Dan Parietti and I did the springtime land class as usual at our AMC office at the YMCA Upper Westside at 5 West 63rd St. As always, during this class we summarize for attendees the two sailing programs that our chapter offers. These are the sailing trips and land classes with the AMC Sailing Committee and the sailing weekends or midweek programs at our AMC Fire Island Cabin, the "FIC". After the presentation of that information, we start reviewing basic sailing techniques, safety on the water, where we sail, which includes Manhasset Bay near Port Washington on Long Island Sound, New Rochelle, the Nyack Boat Club on the Hudson River and at the FIC. We play parts of a learn to sail video and answer any questions. We also cover how to register for a sail and



we let all know that our programs are open to AMC members and non-members. We let them know the cost for a sail with the AMC Sailing Committee, which is usually \$40 for members and \$45 for non-members. We recommend that they check the AMC website for the fees at the FIC.

We also let them know how to register for sailing trips and for the FIC sailing activities as well. Many who attend of land class go on our trips and programs as noted above.

In 2017, Jesse Schaffer and I lead sailing trips out of New Rochelle and Port Washington aboard 23' Sonars. We continue our long relationship with the Port Sailing School http://www.portsailing.com/ and rent boats from them at the discounted rate of \$120 for a four-hour sail. They give us their non-profit origination rate, which is also tax-free. In the many years we have sailed with the school, they have not raised our rate. Over the years, our committee's sailors have developed relationships with the owner of the school and their staff. They like renting boats to us, as they know we are experienced and responsible sailors.



I lead a trip on the July 4th weekend three-day cruise on the 110' schooner Mystic Whaler, https://www.mysticwhalercruises.com/, owned and operated by my friend for over 30 years, Captain John Eginton, out of New London, CT. We sailed to Fisher's Island and Shelter Island and sailed around Shelter Island and back to New London. All had a terrific time.

I am happy to announce that Jim Datri a longtime AMC sailor with his own boat, is back on our committee and plans to do some sails next year on the Great South Bay and including the area near the FIC. Welcome back Jim! Dan Parietti let me know that he will continue to volunteer to teach the introductory sailing land class with me at the NY Chapter office in the spring of each sailing season. That will

be his contribution to the AMC Sailing Committee program going forward. Dan also noted that additionally, he would be willing to assist at the FIC on a short-term basis (once a season event), since he has duties to his Lightning sailboat fleet at Nyack Boat Club. http://www.nyackboatclub.org/ The FIC sailing program under the leadership of John Maier, is doing very well and currently has, at last count, 12 sailing instructors. I understand that they have three sloops and many

Sunfish boats in their fleet. As usual, in 2017, the FIC sailing program had a number of weekend and midweek sailing instruction, practice and related activities as was noted on our website and through Meetup as well. Happily, we have a few people that are part of our apprentice program that seem to have the qualifications to be one of our trip leaders / captains in the near future. One of our goals is to rebuild the AMC Sailing Committee with new trip leaders / captains.

In 2016, we revived a long-standing tradition, an AMC Sailing Committee dinner / business meeting. We did not have the opportunity to do that in 2017 but hope to do so in 2018. Our current advisors to the AMC Sailing Committee are our former Chair, Norman Finkelstein and former Chairs and instructors / captains, Rita Kepich and Toni Cangialosi, and currently inactive instructors, Angela Berardino and Joseph Ryan. Joe is our Treasurer.

As often is the case, a number of the AMC Sailing Committee's trips that were scheduled, were cancelled due to weather or too few AMC sailors who registered for the trips. As always, some of our sailing trips had waiting lists as the trips were full.

We had many compliments from our students and a good time was had by all on our trips.

SKIING Ed Sobin, Chair



The following were accomplished in the 2016/2017 season:

• There were less trips run this past season. Typically it's around 19 but last season there were only 9. This was somewhat expected with 2 of our most active leaders unable to lead. But we have had a few leaders start leading again so 7 leaders led the 9 trips which has added to the variety of offerings.

• The AMC Ski Yahoo group continues to be used by the ski community for exchange of information and arranging short notice trips. This year we are also using the Meetup group for day trips, and may use it for weekends depending on snow and leader availability.

There were 175 messages in the Yahoo group from October 2016 to October 2017. The prior season it was 201 so only 26 fewer than the prior season. There is still considerable interest in how to buy gear, snow conditions, and where to ski. In large part the number of messages depends on the availability of snow. As of November 2, 2017 there are 386 members which is 2 more than the prior year. Currently there are no email bounces in the group.

The overnight and day trips cover a broad spectrum of skiing interests. The main focus is cross country and back-country but there are trips to lift served areas for downhill and telemark since that's often where the only available snow is.

Obviously the Ski Committee's biggest barrier is lack of snow. It is difficult to recruit leaders for day trips when snow conditions are iffy at best. That said, there has been continued interest in using the AMC Ski Yahoo group and Meetup to offer short notice events when conditions are good – several were offered last season and more are expected for this season.

Mohican Outdoor Center sometimes has Cross Country Ski weekends not associated with the Ski committee.

We didn't offer any Miramar trips the last couple of years but this year we are again offering some Miramar trips. At least 5 are planned so far and there may be a few more. We are also working with them and the YM group to get more Young Members going on ski trips. Miramar is a good entry point as they have a bus picking people up in LI, NYC, and NJ so no cars are needed. They also go to large ski areas where it's easy to rent equipment.

Multiple leaders continue to spend considerable effort to put together interesting packages – please consider supporting their efforts by joining them for a great weekend of skiing.

We should be closer to our usual 15+ trips this year if the weather cooperates and the Miramar partnership is successful.

We invite all current skiers, former skiers, and prospective skiers to join us - almost all of the overnight trips welcome and encourage beginners – please check with the leaders. Both downhill and XC centers offer packages (day pass, group lessons, and rental ski equipment).

SOFTBALL Fern Stolper, Chair



The softball committee consists of ten members who organize the AMC softball activities. We meet annually in the winter and as needed during the softball season, April through late fall, weather permitting. During the season, and throughout the year, committee members contact each other via e-mail, in addition to our informal, frequent meetings on the field.

We meet Sunday mornings at 11:00 am and play until 3 pm. Approximately thirty plus to fifty plus players show up each week. We have 2 fields and play 2 games on each. We go over the rules/make announcements each week before the start of play. Sides/teams are randomly chosen for each game allowing everyone to mix, mingle and team up with a variety of teammates.

AMC softball games include a diverse group of members that age from their twenties into their seventies. Players of all skill levels are welcome and we try to foster supportive, harmonious, injurypreventing atmosphere. This is also reflected in our rules of the games. We also try to accommodate a player's wishes, for example, as to a particular position he/she might want to play.

The games are posted on the AMC site and on Meetup (450+ members). A camaraderie has developed amongst the participants. As an example, players use the Meetup site to encourage a sick player to recover quickly, to comment about the games, to enjoy reading one of our committee member's weekly diary. Everyone looks forward to our annual pizza party.



We collect \$5 from each player each week to cover expenses which include buying and transporting equipment; fees for field permits and Meetup.



The YM committee board successfully transitioned to new leadership with members adopting new roles helping to continue our growth.





Leadership Committee Ed Sobin, Chair

In this second year of the Leadership Committee we've continued what was started last year. Our goals are basically unchanged -

ADVISORY

The Advisory Committee provides two services to the Executive Committee: a) ad hoc advice and guidance upon request and b) management of the Chapter's Volunteer Recognition Awards.

In its advisory capacity, Eileen Yin suggested specific Payment Controls to the Executive Committee. Payment Controls would tighten procedures when the chapter issues outgoing payments. Some of the suggested guidelines include: 2-step payment approval process and payments sent only to independently verified payment instructions.

This is the first year the Advisory Committee oversaw the selection process for all four Chapter Volunteer Recognition Awards. The voting panel for Appie of the Year is comprised of past Chapter Chairs. The Chapter voted in a new Conservation Committee Chair in March.



The Erase the Trace campaign was continued at this year's Annual Chapter Picnic, with volunteers receiving gear, like tshirts, that sported a member-made Erase the Trace logo. The Committee also hosted a Leave No Trace workshop where members learned about LNT principles and brainstormed ways they could participate in the Erase the Trace campaign.

The Chapter's Leadership Workshop Weekend was infused with conservation topics as well. In particular, the field scenarios included scenarios where leaders-in-training practiced Leave No Trace principles.

This fall, the Chapter will participate in the Club-wide efforts to support the permanent funding of the Land and Water Conservation Fund (LWCF). The Conservation Committee will host events to support members in contacting their elected representatives, like the "Congress for Conservation : Post Card Party" in November.

For 2018, the Chapter Conservation Committee looks forward to hosting Leave No Trace awareness workshops, encouraging trips to be held in areas impacted by the LWCF, furthering the Erase the Trace campaign within the individual Activities Committees, and hosting conservation topic speaker events and movie nights.



TRAILS COMMITTEE Hope Rodgers, Chair



Once again, our many hard-working maintainers took care of 9 miles of trails east of the Hudson, 17 miles in New Jersey, and 41 miles west of the Hudson, primarily in Harriman/Bear Mt. State Parks. A rainy spring and summer, as well as the continued proliferation of aggressive non-native vines and other plants, made for a challenging trail maintenance year. New growth was constant. A few more maintainers signed on in September to help with clipping, sawing and marking, so we hope the ragged bits are just about tamed.

After nine hard-working years on the job, Herb Hochberg resigned as chair of our east of Hudson trails. Joe Rodriguez, who has been working with him, is the new chair, so continuity is assured. Steve Weissman, who also runs maintenance for the AT in New Jersey, continued to supervise a highly organized group of maintainers in New Jersey. In Harriman/Bear Mt. State Park, Bill Hladky, always raring to go, supported, assisted and recruited a large troupe of maintainers.

In June, the chapter held its first trail maintenance weekend at the Corman Harriman Outdoor Center. An enthusiastic group

ranging from high school age to post-retirement signed up for the weekend. Participants learned principles of trail building and then practiced what they had learned on the new Pond Loop Trail around Harriman's Breakneck Pond. Lots of rock smashing, rock moving, cutting, and digging. From trail building theory, to tool selection, to hard labor, to tool cleaning and maintenance, there was a lot to take in. Many participants commented that they will never look at a trail the same way again. The weekenders drove home tired but intrigued. Experienced AMC staffer Jonathan Martin provided invaluable instruction, assisted by several hearty, patient young AMC trail builders.



The chapter now has a stash of trail maintenance tools at the Corman Harriman Outdoor Center. These tools can be used for group trail maintenance outings, or for individual

maintainers who don't have tools of their own. So we hope it's now easy for more people to join in maintaining our beautiful trails!





WILDERNESS FIRST AID

The mission of the Wilderness First Aid committee is to provide professional quality wilderness first aid training to chapter members and to encourage members to get this kind of training. We stand ready to provide support to any unit of the club who wishes to learn more about wilderness emergency care.

During 2017, our twentieth year, we conducted 5 WFA courses. We trained over 60 chapter members and others in the basics of wilderness emergency care.

Maureen McCahery has been with us since our inception in 1997. During that time she has lead 21 courses and assisted in 12 more. She has also served as Co-chair for most of that time. Her work for the WFA committee has been invaluable and in no small part contributed to our success. Maureen will be taking a break from her instructor's position but will continue to advise the committee. Richard Dabal who has been with us almost as long will be taking the position of Assistant Chair.

We want to welcome Ethan Gracer on board as our newest instructor candidate. Ethan comes to us with a wealth of outdoor experience:

- Over 300 field days as remote wilderness guide and instructor for teenagers and young adults in Massachusetts, Utah, Oregon, and Alaska.
- 180 field days as a guide for a wilderness-based therapeutic intervention program.
- 170 additional field days as a participant in remote wilderness trips worldwide (North & South America, Africa, and Australia).
- Medical and Ground Search Volunteer for Deschutes County Search and Rescue in Oregon. 100 hours standard training, 16 hours supplemental medical training, responded to 5 medical missions in 2016.
- NOLS Semester and Wilderness First Responder Graduate.
- Consistent WFR and CPR certification from 2011 to present.

We will continue to run our voucher program in 2018. The WFA committee makes available two vouchers to each activity committee chair for distribution to people active in their committee. Each voucher is worth \$40.00 off the cost of a WFA committee sponsored wilderness first aid course.

The WFA committee is constantly on the lookout for new, qualified instructors. If you know of anyone who has significant pre-hospital emergency care (EMT, Ski Patrol, etc.) and outdoor experience, we encourage you to have them contact Jonathan Silver at <u>WildernessFirstAid@amc-ny.org</u>.
